**Phyllis Thompson, PhD, LCSW, Assistant Professor, Worden School of Social Service, Our Lady of the Lake University**

This session begins by establishing a foundation of shared knowledge related to ethical values & principles, guidelines, and decision-making models. Participants will work within groups to identify and apply decision-making models to vignettes of ethical problems and dilemmas grounded within the context of working with clients convicted of sexual offenses. Groups will also discuss the roles for purposeful internal critical reflection and use of supervision and the functions for identifying and addressing personal biases as they emerge in practice. Finally, groups will brainstorm strategies for creating their own personal self-care plan to promote and sustain ethical practice within their field.

1. Explain the difference between an ethical problem and dilemma.
2. Identify and discuss ethical issues and dilemmas that emerge within the context of working with clients convicted of a sexual offense.
3. Discuss and apply an ethical decision making process to ethical problems.
4. Describe and apply an Ethical Decision Making Model to resolve ethical dilemmas.
5. Examine the roles for purposeful internal critical reflection and supervision and its function for identifying and addressing personal biases as they emerge in practice.
6. Discuss the role healthy self-care serves for providing ethical services and brainstorm strategies to begin creating your own personal healthy self-care plan to promote and sustain ethical practice.

Mr. Prescott has authored and edited 13 books on the assessment and treatment of sexual aggression across the life span. He has provided training from Western Australia to Northern Canada and Eastern Europe, and serves on the advisory boards of two scholarly journals. He is a member of the Motivational Interviewing Network of Trainers and is a Certified Trainer for the International Center for Clinical Excellence. He is a Past President for the Association for the Treatment of Sexual Abusers and is currently the Director of Professional Development and Quality Improvement for the Becket Family of Services in Northern New England.

**Where We Are And Where We Need To Be: Assessment, Treatment and Supervision**

Mr. Prescott will review what we do and don't know about adolescents who sexually abuse, and review current controversial areas of practice. He will offer suggestions for the most effective and efficient methods for assessment, treatment and supervision.

**I. Chaperone Training for Parents of Juveniles with Sexual Behavior Problems**

**Diana Garza Louis, LPC, LMFT, LSOTP**

Preparing parents and family members who supervise juveniles with sexual behavior problems is essential for their success in treatment. This workshop will review expectations and responsibilities for chaperones as well as discuss some elements that chaperones should be aware of in supervising an eventual reunification of juveniles and victims.

**II. The Psychology of Criminal Sexuality: Analysis of Fetishes, Paraphilias, and Psychopathology (Part 1)**

This training presentation will examine the developmental foundations of various types of criminal sexuality, along with the impact of different kinds of psychopathology on deviant sexual preferences. It examines how a person develops deviant sexual interests, often as a juvenile during childhood and adolescence. Sex offenders vary by type, degree of severity, and classification of offense, which affects management in prison, as well as in the community on parole. Topics will include: the developmental impact of symbolism, fetishism, ritualism, and fantasy, along with the classifications of several of the most common forms of criminal sexuality, psychological motivations of sexual offenders, exacerbating influences of paraphilias, psychopathy, pornography, behavioral triggers, and cultural perspectives. Relevant juvenile and adult case studies will be utilized to illustrate various concepts associated with criminal sexuality.

**I. Why Can't They Just Behave – Domestic Violence, Childhood Trauma, and the Fear Response (Part 1)**

**Craig Corder, Project Coordinator, Correctional Management Institute of Texas**

Early childhood trauma stemming from an abusive, chaotic, or violent home life is an important but sometimes overlooked factor when addressing a child's current behavior patterns. Juvenile justice professionals need to be aware that children who are sexually abused or raised in a harsh or dysfunctional environment become survivalists and although they appear to be a certain age physically, inside they may be playing catch-up – emotionally, behaviorally, and developmentally.

This session will focus on the developmental deficits and chronic fear that evolves in children who are raised in these environments and address some of the unspoken messages behind a child's behavior. Participants will learn to look beyond the child's difficult behavior and develop strategies to begin disarming the primitive fear responses instilled by sexual abuse and other traumatic events that may have led them into the juvenile justice system.

**II. Shared Territory: A Team Approach to Effective Probation Supervision of Juvenile Offenders**

Effective supervision of juveniles with sexual behavior problems is territory shared by probation officers, therapists, families and courts. In working toward the goal of no more victims, teams must be alert, observant and knowledgeable, as well as prepared with information-gathering techniques and questions. In this session, a review of best practices in probation supervision, including the vital piece of collaboration with therapists, will be reviewed. The success of a child and family in treatment and probation is greatest when a committed team is working to encourage and support honesty, accountability and communication.

In learning about thinking errors, attendees will identify ways to correct their own attitudes and behavior to facilitate healthier communication. Media and humor will be used to teach and reinforce concepts.

This presentation will provide an overview of evidence based practices and programs utilized within the secure state operated facilities of the Texas Juvenile Justice Department. Discussion will include topics such as challenges with implementation and fidelity to program models in secure settings.

Data will be presented regarding TJJD youth characteristics and treatment needs as well as a discussion of recent agency initiatives and grant works in areas of: Traumatic Brain Injury, Trauma Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy, and Non-Suicidal Self Injury.

**III. Sexuality in Adolescence: What's "Normal"?**

This session will provide an overview of sexual development through the teen years. Participants will engage in an interactive discussion about the physical and psychological changes that occur among youth as they transition into adulthood. The current trends in the sexual behaviors among adolescents in the U.S. will also be discussed.
